Lethal autonomous weapons (LAWs) are disrupting warfare in complex а era characterised by an unsure America, an a rising India, assertive China, an aggressive Russia. Thirty countries have called for a global ban on LAWs, citing both the humanitarian consequences of 'robot warfare' and the need to have a human 'in the loop' of any decision to use lethal force. However, the four countries noted above see autonomous weapons as crucial to geopolitical power in the 21st century. This presentation surveys the global debate on LAWs and considers the future of the 21st century warfare, in which highly sophisticated "smart" weapons are merging with a resurgence of early 20th century

ways of thinking about state power
